Singapore's rich maritime history dates back to the 13th Century when it was known as **Temasek**—its natural deep-water harbour made the island an integral stop for ships large and small. **Sang Nila Utama** is believed to have stepped onto our shores in 1299 along what is today known as Telok Blangah.

The creation of **Suez Canal** in 1869 was the biggest boost to the country's maritime sea trade—ships no longer had to loop around Africa to reach Asia. In 1870, just a year later, Singapore's trade revenue reached \$71 million.

Singapore was an important route for Asian trade of goods such as **takawood** and **hornbill casques**. In the 15th century, under the Malay Malacca Sultanate, its maritime trade route also encompassed the world's largest spice market. The industrial West's demand for **tin** and **rubber** elevated it to the status of one of the greatest ports in the world.

DUBAI, UNITED ARAB EMIRATES

If you're keen to swim with sharks but apprehensive of the open water, the Dubai Aquarium & Underwater Zoo has just the thing for you. The state-of-the-art aquarium offers visitors the opportunity to swim in a shark enclosure, supervised by trained staff members. The experience sees you placed in a thick, transparent acrylic enclosure, which is then lowered into a tank that houses both blacktip and sand sharks.

Dubai has plenty more to offer thrillseekers. Spend a day out in the desert quad biking or riding camels, take a marina cruise through some of the city's stunning sights, or steep yourself in culture at the largest mosque in the country, the Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque in Abu Dhabi.

PLAY

Dubai is also acclaimed for its golfing scene, so swing by the Arabian Ranches Golf Club (arabianranchesgolfclub.com), with 18 holes and desert-style grass, to have your hand at the gentlemen's game.

NASSAU, THE BAHAMAS

The Bahamas is one of the best places in the world to dive with sharks and Nassau, its capital city, is where all the action is. There are many companies in the area that offer guided dive tours for those with a license, or relaxed snorkelling tours for amateurs. Either way, you'll get to swim alongside a shiver of Caribbean reef sharks or spot them from a comfortable distance. More gung-ho divers can sign up for an opportunity to feed sharks to experience how these predators feast in real-time.

Don't miss out on Nassau's equally rich on-land experiences. The Ardastra Gardens & Wildlife Conservation Centre houses a variety of wildlife including the national bird, the Caribbean flamingo. On the culinary front, the island territory boasts a thriving fresh and fried seafood scene, so pop into its fish fry joints to get your fix. The Bahamas is also known for its long-standing history with rum distillation. Many of the distilleries call Nassau home, including the iconic John Watling's, which offers free tours for guests.

PLAY

Nassau is easily accessed via a three-hour flight from New York. While you're stateside, make a pitstop at the Manhasset Bay Yacht Club (manhassetbayyc.org), known for its rich history and sailing facilities.





LA JOLLA, CALIFORNIA, USA

Leopard sharks are known for being one of the friendliest and most harmless to humans. Enjoy face time with these serene swimmers in La Jolla, California's famed breeding ground for leopard sharks. Each summer, hundreds of these mammals swim to La Jolla and go right up to the shore, so you won't even have to put your diving gear on to interact with them—simply snorkelling will suffice.

Beyond sharks, La Jolla is also known for its coastal offerings, from a lively pier and boardwalk scene to stunning beaches. Cultural, family-friendly activities abound as well, from the acclaimed Birch Aquarium well known for their conservation efforts, to the Map and Atlas Museum, with over 500 rare maps that date back centuries.

PLAY

If you're sailing around the state, pay a visit to the California Yacht Club (calyachtclub.com). Founded in 1922, it is one of the oldest, most beautiful yacht clubs on the US West Coast.

SOUTH WEST ROCKS, AUSTRALIA

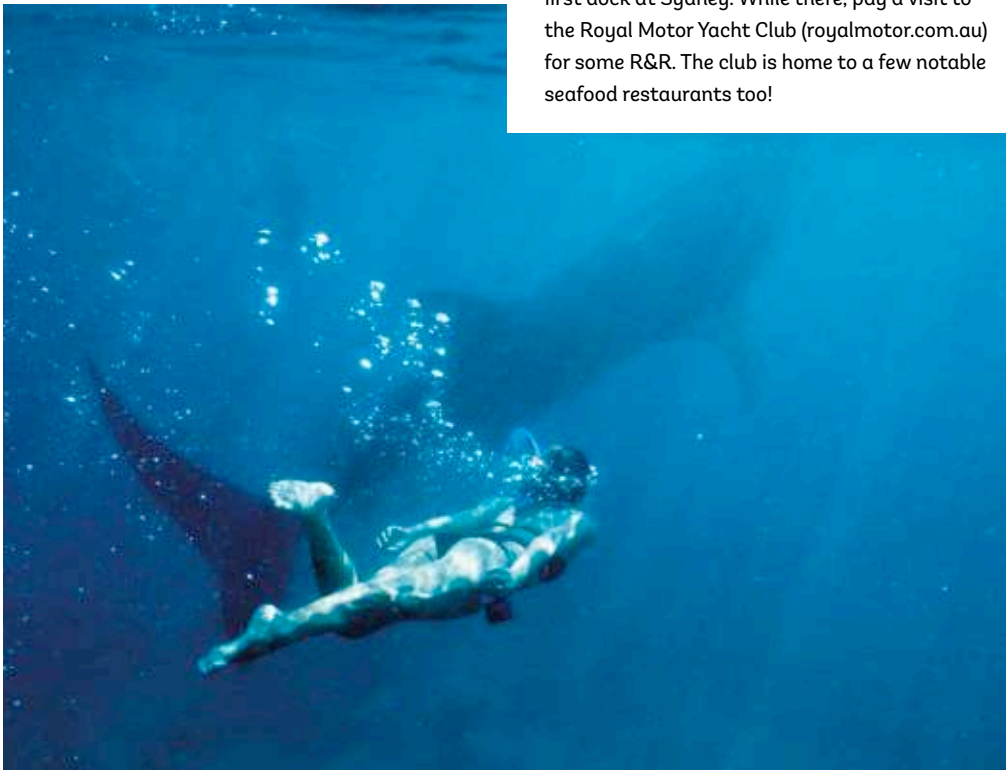
South West Rocks in New South Wales is home to Fish Rock Cave, a world-renowned diving site that is also a critical habitat for the endangered grey nurse shark. Plenty of dive centres in the area offer boat charters and diving trips to the site for you to get up close and personal (safely!) with these docile, loveable marine creatures.

Aside from nurse sharks, the cave is vibrant with a multitude of aquatic animals, including black rays, turtles, and cuttlefish. It's also worth noting that hammerhead sharks pay the coast a visit there later in the year, typically during October to January, so plan your trip during the warmer months if you'd like to experience this staggering sight for yourself.

After a day of diving, head back to South West Rocks to unwind and catch the sunset at some of New South Wales' hidden beach gems such as Trial Gaol Beach and North Smoky Beach. The latter is home to the Smoky Cape Lighthouse, a national monument built in 1891, which you can hike up to from the beach.

PLAY

A trip to South West Rocks would require you to first dock at Sydney. While there, pay a visit to the Royal Motor Yacht Club (royalmotor.com.au) for some R&R. The club is home to a few notable seafood restaurants too!

WILMINGTON, NORTH CAROLINA, USA

Wilmington is a historic hotspot for shipwrecks, and this, over time, has become quite the attraction for local sand tiger sharks. These gentle giants grow up to three metres long and call Wilmington home year-round. Book yourself a dive tour to experience scenic schools of these creatures swimming through ghostly shipwrecks—a visual feast for any budding marine photographer. Sand tiger sharks are known to swim with their mouths open too, serving up fearsome “smiles” for divers, with their jagged teeth on full display.

Once done with diving, visitors can explore some of Wilmington’s truly Southern sights. Architecture buffs should take a stroll through the Historic District, lined with over 800 buildings that date back to the 17th century. The Airlie Gardens are particularly beautiful during the warmer months, with centuries-old oak trees and floral arrangements across its 67 acres. 📍

PLAY

If you’re road-tripping to Wilmington from Pennsylvania, recharge at the Hamilton Club (hamiltonclub.org), a prestigious social club founded in 1889.





CAREER CHAMELEON

SERIAL ENTREPRENEUR AND MEDICAL DOCTOR DANIEL HE HAS DEFIED MORE CAREER BOUNDARIES THAN ONE CAN KEEP TRACK OF.

It's difficult to describe Daniel He in a nutshell. He has seamlessly transitioned between multiple careers and entrepreneurial endeavours in his life, from hospitality to technology to medical science—he is also a Medical Doctor with a Master in Emergency medicine. It's very evident that he wants to steer clear of pigeon-holing himself.

Daniel attributes his innate curiosity to his parents. “Both of them were teachers and big fans of lifelong learning, even before it became a thing,” he says. His science teacher dad also inculcated a curiosity for technology in him.

MULTIPLE PATHWAYS

These early influences have carved his life and career path. He started out in a management

consulting firm after graduating in not one but three majors in completely different disciplines—Economics, Political Science and Neuroscience—from the University of Michigan. Daniel describes his first job as a testing ground of sorts—“the place for people who don't know what they want to do in life given the broad sweep of companies and industries one gets exposed to”, he jokes.

He co-founded The Lo & Behold Group (TL&BG) with his friend Teng Wen Lee (who is now the sole owner and Managing Director) when he was on a gap year from work. The idea was literally formulated on a rooftop space overlooking Raffles Singapore hotel, propelled by the desire to create Singapore's first rooftop bar. Although now defunct, Loof pioneered a change in Singapore's bar scene, and TL&BG went on to change its culinary landscape as the duo began seeking similarly interesting and abandoned spaces to set up restaurants and more.

“It wasn't a grand strategy to set up a hospitality group, rather just the two of us falling in love with multiple places and seeing how best



we could open it up and let more people enjoy it,” says Daniel. “We were very lucky to have started at a time when Singapore’s hospitality scene was not very developed,” he adds with humility.

Despite riding the success wave, eight years later, Daniel decided to leave the hospitality scene completely and focus on a second career: Medicine. It was a solution to a quarterlife crisis, as he describes it, being the farthest from F&B. But it was also a natural choice given his keen interest in Biology. Daniel completed his medical degree at Duke-Nus Medical School and went on to work in Singapore General Hospital’s Accident and Emergency department.

Daniel is currently on a break from his doctor career and focusing on his new venture, The Kinetic Option (TKO), a marine propulsion company that specialises in electric drivetrains for small watercrafts.

NEW WATERS

“I like to try new things. I had spent about eight to 10 years in F&B, and then 10 years in medicine, so it’s kind of a natural time for me to start moving on to something a little bit different,” he says matter-of-factly.

One understands how the technology aspect could have been a big draw for Daniel. He also heads the Singapore Drone Association, so his familiarity with electric drivetrains does not come as much of a surprise—not at this point of our conversation at least.

But he throws in a curve ball when he reveals that he has an equal affinity to water. An avid swimmer, Daniel used to sail for his alma mater Anglo Chinese School as well. Thanks to a math teacher, who was also a dive instructor trainer, he obtained his diving license at the age of 14.

The idea for TKO was conceived during COVID-19 lockdown along with his primary school friend who is a naval architect. For Daniel, it was the perfect opportunity to marry a few interests, capitalise on Singapore’s renewed interest in the yachting lifestyle and create a product that would have as slight a footprint as possible on our oceans.

“Singapore is a maritime nation; we are surrounded by water, but there’s almost very little innovation in the electric propulsion space for small crafts. There’s a huge amount of opportunity to bring electric drives to boats, everything from small watercrafts to larger vessels, but electronics and water don’t always mix, so it’s been a bit slow to take off,” he says. He is confident of the interest and the

technology to make it happen. TKO was officially launched during the recent Singapore Yachting Festival at ONE*15 Marina Sentosa Cove.

It is the first company of its kind in Singapore to manufacture and assemble these small watercrafts in Singapore and is all set to expand its operations to other countries.

“I have this terrible habit of turning hobbies into jobs. I have been lucky that the fun and business aspects have tended to align themselves quite well,” laughs Daniel. That along with the unwavering support of his family—his parents and wife have never questioned his choices.

A paediatric doctor at KK Hospital Singapore, his wife is equally unconventional having done a career pivot from anthropology—during which she spent time with tribes in Siberia, herding reindeer, to understand their social setup.

The family of three going on four—the couple have a five-year-old daughter and are currently expecting a son—make sure to carve out time together, indulging their shared love for food and new places. “She loves the mountains, I love the sea, so we try to meet in the middle when we travel,” says Daniel.

NO LIMITS

Daniel’s career trajectory and endless pursuit of new and interesting things makes one draw parallels to the stanza in Dr Seuss’ book *Oh, the Places You’ll Go!*: “You have brains in your head. You have feet in your shoes. You can steer yourself in any direction you choose.”

The path has not been hurdle-free, there have been challenges and naysayers. Daniel’s passion and knowledge about each project he has

embarked on—being the person who knows what he’s talking about rather than one who is just looking at it as a business opportunity—have held him in good stead.

He does see himself going back to emergency medicine and upgrading himself as he counts it as one of the most enriching experiences in his life. “To me, emergency medicine is probably the most interesting part of medicine. I like working with my hands and interacting with people, and it is where I can make a definite difference on a minute-to-minute basis,” he says.

His focus is now on getting TKO to a level of stability, before exploring other aspects of the industry. As he says: “There’s literally so many different things you can do in the world—there’s no reason to limit yourself to just one.”

QUOTE

George Bernard Shaw said it best: ‘All progress depends on the unreasonable man.’ My takeaway from that is, one should constantly challenge the status quo. That’s the only way things get better for any job or any career.

DOWNTIME

I love ocean swimming, so every Sunday I do a four-kilometre stretch—from Tanjong Beach Club to Siloso Beach with a group of friends. That’s my meditation, my exercise and my escape.

FOOD

If I had to choose one last meal, it would be a toss-up between Black Pepper Crab and Laksa. As far as favourite haunts go, nothing beats Odette for Western food. I also really like this hole-in-the-wall sushi restaurant in Duxton Hill called Miyu.





JOURNEY OF LIFE

CAPTAIN RAYMOND SEET BELIEVES IN CONSTANT UPSKILLING TO FEED HIS PASSION FOR THE SEAS AND BE A MASTER IN HIS FIELD.

Captain Raymond Seet first fell in love with the seas in the '90s—when, shortly after his National Service, he bought a second-hand speed boat from his friend for \$7,000.

He had the opportunity to meet people from the marine salvage industry during his time out at sea and “was fortunate to join them on certain assignments”. Raymond adds that the experience widened his horizons and deepened his knowledge of Singapore waters.

Little did he realise then that his sense of adventure would eventually lead him to be at the helm of an Azimut Grande 32 Metri 20 years down the road.

VAST EXPERIENCE

Raymond is not new to water or water-related activities—he has previously worked as a wakeboarding instructor, swimming coach and is also a certified PADI open water scuba diving instructor. Yet being on a boat presented a whole other experience.

He replaced his speed boat for a second-hand 20ft cabin cruiser, so he could explore further up Malaysia. Although, he sold it to fund his PADI Instructor Development Course in Phuket, Raymond managed to clock some memorable experiences on his cruiser, including a magical night to Sevana Cove Resort and Nongsa Point Marina & Resort with only the sounds of waves and stars as his companions.

Raymond has been involved in the yachting industry for close to two decades. He has his own shipping agency, handling migration and port clearance for foreign yachts entering Singapore, and has also taken on ad-hoc assignments as a yacht delivery captain.

From fixing a cracked exhaust manifold to removing tangled fishing nets from the yacht’s propeller during rough weather conditions at night, Raymond has had his fair share of risky encounters as a yacht delivery captain.

“Anything can happen during the delivery. The worst-case scenario is being stranded at sea in

adverse weather due to an engine failure with no immediate help for days,” he elaborates.

Despite the potential dangers, he relishes the adventures and believes that it has strengthened his problem-solving skills. To him, everything pales in comparison to the satisfaction of delivering a yacht in good condition to its new owners.

While he no doubt enjoys driving a yacht and exploring the open seas, Raymond is realistic. “The cost of maintaining one can be quite substantial, not to mention the time and effort required to take care of it.” The next best option to satisfy his passion for the seas and earn an income while doing it was to become a captain, he laughs.

In May 2021, he became a full-time captain, leading a small crew on board the brand new Azimut superyacht *Chestnut*.

A LIFELONG LEARNER

Rewarding as it is, captaining a yacht can be a very demanding profession, admits the 46-year-old Singaporean Captain. This has been his biggest motivation to upskill himself in order to stay relevant. After all, opportunities belong to those who are prepared—a motto he strongly believes in.

When borders started reopening last year, the first thing he did was to fly to Australia to complete four weeks of RYA Yachtmaster Ocean training—he had already completed some of the modules such as the RYA Yachtmaster Offshore in Fort Lauderdale Florida, USA, before the pandemic hit and derailed his plans.

The course required him to complete a two-week ocean passage on a sailing yacht from Sydney to Eden, then over to Lord Howe Island before returning to Sydney.

“That was a really tough and challenging experience as Australian weather conditions are very different to Singapore,” says Raymond. “As sailing yachts rely heavily on wind power to move, they require a more hands-on approach, which can be very tedious and tiring.”

His quest to upskill continues. He recently enrolled himself in the Certificate of Competency Class 4 Master (Special Limit) course at Singapore Polytechnic, and hopes to get his MCA Master of Yachts 3000GT certification in the next five years.

The father of two young children—aged 3 and 1—is grateful to have the support of his wife to explore such unlimited possibilities. When preparation meets opportunity, he trusts that success will not be far.

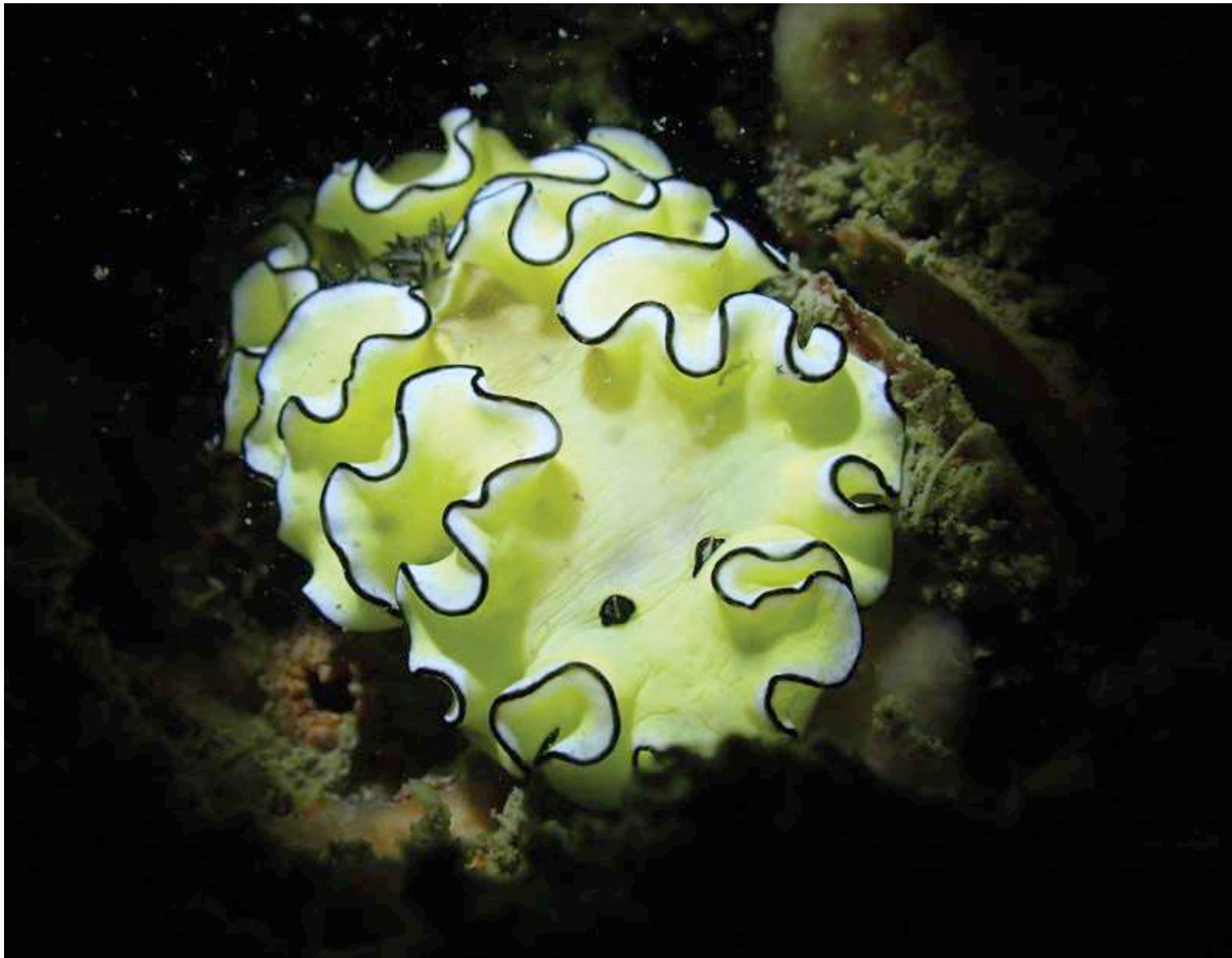

W e are used to seeing beautiful boats moored at ONE°15 Marina Sentosa Cove, but have you ever wondered what could be hiding below them?

Considering the Club's tireless efforts in ensuring its waters are kept as pristine as possible, its thriving marine ecosystem does not come as a surprise.

It all started during ONE°15 Marina's 14th Anniversary celebration on 12 September, 2021. The Club organised an Ocean Conservation Awareness Day to showcase its efforts and the results of the various environmental projects it has championed over the years.

The Club's commitment to reef preservation and the protection of its marine life was clearly evident during the ONE°15 Marina Coral Garden Tour. As we were introduced to the stations holding the prolific coral life on the boardwalk, I thought to myself that it would be so wonderful to be able to scuba dive in the marina.

A few weeks later, I chanced upon the offer to learn to dive with White Manta Diving School (WMDS) at the Club itself. By December that year, my son had signed up for the PADI Advance course, and as some of the modules in the course were to be done at the Club, we joined in the inaugural Night Dive on 28 December, 2021.

Diving in Singapore waters is like a *Where's Wally* challenge—pray that there are no strong currents as that combined with the murky waters would be no fun at all. Even though we may not have crystal

clear visibility, the calmness of the marina waters makes up for the test to your eyesight.

No worries about getting lost or losing your buddy or struggling to climb back up on your boat. There is even a flat concrete pontoon slab for you to rest on so you do not disturb the bottom life. This was purpose-built for students to perform their exercises or allow them to rest comfortably whilst the instructor does the necessary assessments.

Occasionally, you may feel a gentle surge from the wake created by a passing vessel but aside from that, it is just simply relaxing. The dives are very shallow, no deeper than four meters on the "canal" side, so you can get a longer dive if your air consumption is well-controlled.

As the bottom is silty as in most dive sites around Singapore, it is important to move slowly and avoid stirring up the sediment below. Going slow and steady means you will be able to spot a variety of small critters such as seahorses, nudibranchs, crabs and cleaner shrimp. The highlight of our dive was the active resident cuttlefish and the very shy seahorses. These sheltered waters provide a safe crèche for juvenile fishes and marine creatures.

The pictures taken by Vincent Chew, Managing Director of WMDS are proof of the prolific marine life in the waters of ONE°15 Marina Sentosa Cove. For those keen on underwater photography, a dive led by Vincent is perfect to test out your new camera—look for the elusive Shaun the Sheep, an adorable sea slug or nudibranch.

There is no doubt that the diving experience at the marina has revived my love for the sport. For those of you who are contemplating learning how to dive, or keen on underwater photography, I highly recommend embarking on your underwater exploration journey with WMDS at the Club. 📷

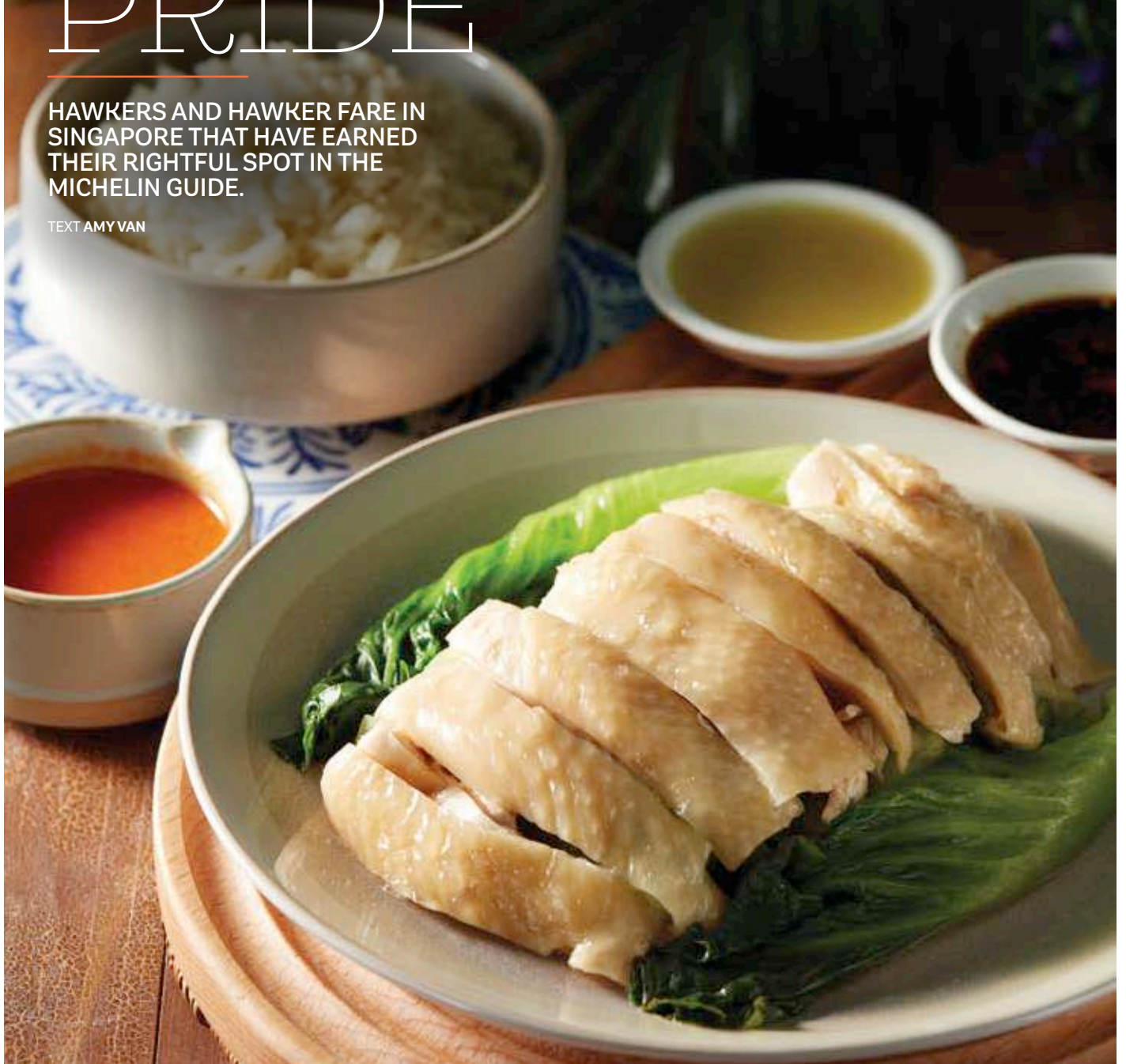

HAWKERS AND HAWKER FARE IN SINGAPORE THAT HAVE EARNED THEIR RIGHTFUL SPOT IN THE MICHELIN GUIDE.

Food is an intrinsic part of Singapore, so much so that hawker centres, food courts and local coffeeshops have become part of a heritage worth preserving. Adding to this is the nation's varied food culture originating from the immigrant groups that settled here—although some of the recipes have evolved over the decades based on the availability of ingredients, and to accommodate changing diets. Nevertheless many of the stalls still attract throngs of diners hankering for a familiar taste that is delicious as it is comforting.

Hawker culture in Singapore was inscribed on the 2020 Unesco Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. Foodies here have been hoping that this recognition will help boost the status of hawkers, many of whom are retiring, while inspiring new and younger cooks to join the industry.

Meanwhile, a total of 67 food businesses (including 40 hawker stalls and five street food stalls) were awarded a Bib Gourmand award in the Michelin Guide Singapore 2022.

We shine the spotlight on some of the local food gems as recommended by Bib Gourmand. Some are new entries, while a couple are stalwarts, but they all draw long queues of diners waiting for a taste of their moreish dishes.



Lixin Teochew Fishball Noodles

This business was founded in 1968 by Lim Lee Seng who started selling fishball noodles from a pushcart. His secret to longevity? Using only the freshest ingredients for the fishballs, fish dumplings and fishcakes.

In the early days, Lee Seng would travel to Jurong's fishery port to buy freshly caught yellowtail fish. He would then painstakingly prepare everything from scratch—scraping fish meat off the bones and moulding each fishball.

In the '70s, Lee Seng and his wife set up their first stall at Bendemeer Road Hawker Centre. After the food centre shut down in 1987, they shifted to Toa Payoh, where they roll out their popular Teochew noodles till date. The couple and their son Eddie expanded the business and launched an outlet at ION Orchard's Food Opera in 2009. The family now has 10 more outlets in food courts islandwide.

These days, Lixin's products are prepared in a central kitchen. Signature yellowtail fishballs are made twice a day. And handmade fishcakes are made from 100 per cent yellowtail fish sans fillers. They are paired with noodles of your choice and topped with crispy lard and piquant homemade chilli sauce.

FUN FACT

Fish meat is usually thrown or tossed against a mixing bowl during the kneading process (similar to kneading bread dough) to derive a welcome springy texture.



Sing Lung HK Cheong Fun

Chef Kong Yiu Man has 40 years' experience in Cantonese cooking at various restaurants and hotels in Hong Kong, London and Singapore. Today the former Crystal Jade dim sum chef prepares velvety smooth Hong Kong-style rice rolls or cheong fun at his own stall. Launched in January 2022, the small outlet is located at a coffeeshop next to the popular Golden Mile Food Centre.

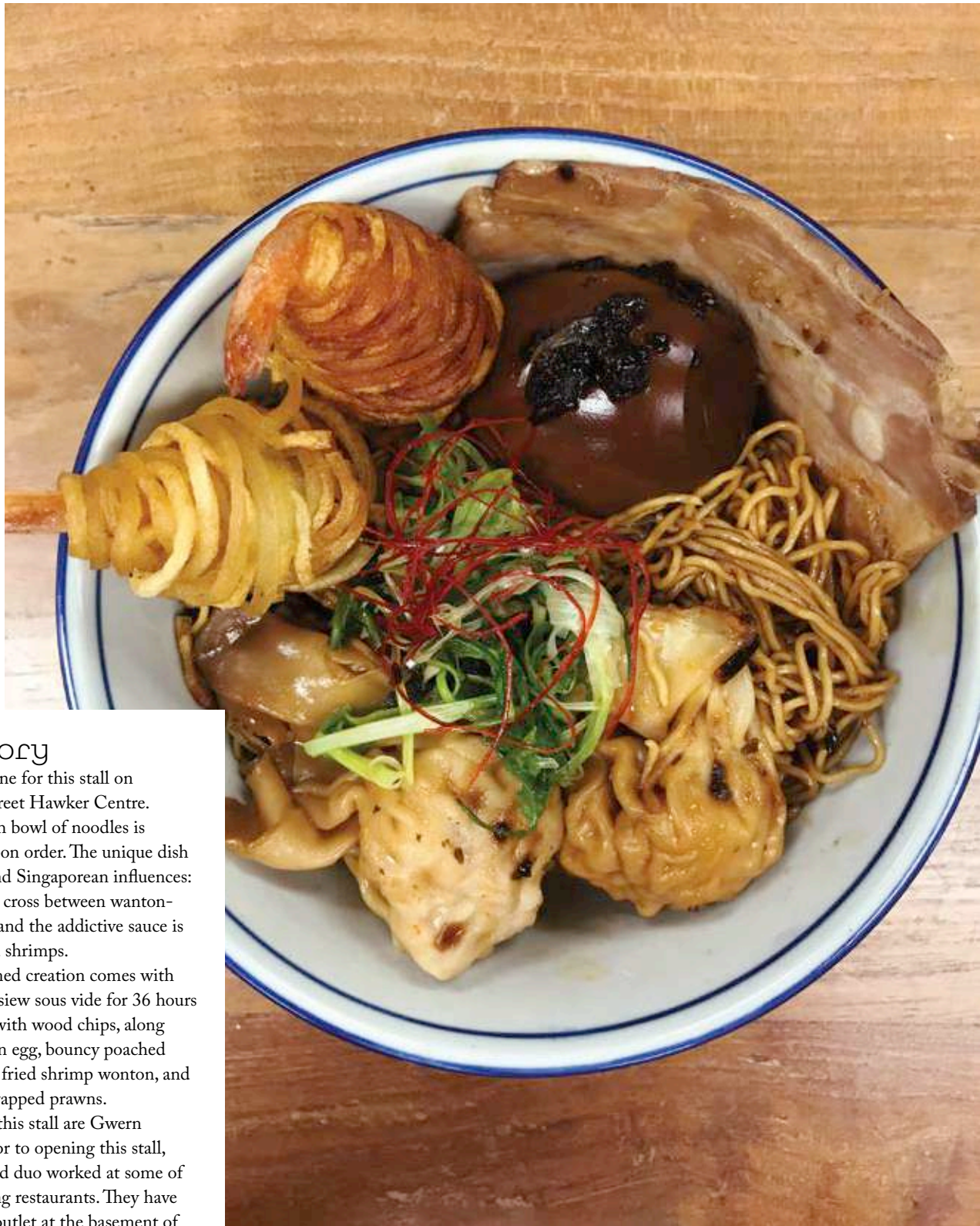
Sing Lung's menu features four types of cheong fun—plain (laced with a mix of sesame, peanut, soy sauce and sweet sauce), or filled with prawn, char siew or mushroom. You can also request for a dollop of addictive homemade chilli to spice up the rice rolls.

As the rolls are made to order and freshly steamed, expect to wait a bit for your portion to be served. Other items offered here include century egg pork congee and Hong Kong glutinous rice—they sell out quite fast so get there early.

FUN FACT

Cheong fun means pork intestine noodle because these rice rolls resemble intestines—a popular ingredient in Southern Chinese cooking.





A Noodle Story

People often make a beeline for this stall on the first floor of Amoy Street Hawker Centre. It's understandable as each bowl of noodles is painstakingly prepared upon order. The unique dish is woven with Japanese and Singaporean influences: Special thin noodles are a cross between wanton-style noodles and ramen, and the addictive sauce is made of sambal and dried shrimps.

The generously portioned creation comes with succulent pork belly char siew sous vide for 36 hours and then lightly smoked with wood chips, along with a soy-flavoured onsen egg, bouncy poached prawn dumplings, golden fried shrimp wonton, and crispy shredded potato wrapped prawns.

The two chefs behind this stall are Gwern Khoo and Ben Tham. Prior to opening this stall, the culinary school-trained duo worked at some of Singapore's top fine-dining restaurants. They have since expanded to a new outlet at the basement of Guoco Tower.

For a similar elevated carb fix, enjoy classic Hokkien Prawn Noodles with prawns, roasted pork belly, squid, egg, yellow noodles and vermicelli at LATITUDE Bistro, or Pan-fried Crispy Noodles with Seafood at WOK°15 Kitchen.

FUN FACT

Wonton mee is believed to have originated in Guangzhou during the Qing dynasty (1644-1911). The dish was introduced to Hong Kong by Mak Woon Chi—founder of the legendary Mak's Noodle—during World War II.



Outram Park Fried Kway Teow Mee

This classic fried dish dates back to 1939. It was founded as a streetside stall by the father of current owner Ng Chin Chye. Chin Chye continues to run the business with his wife and two sons at their stall at Hong Lim Market & Food Centre stall—which sees long queues of hungry diners daily.

Fans hanker for the addictive flat rice noodles tossed with fresh ingredients like eggs, beansprouts, cockles and crispy pork lard. The tangles of noodles are fried over high heat and imbued with a welcome smoky wok hei (the flavour and tastes imparted on food by a hot wok during stir frying). A generous amount

of dark soy sauce and chilli add depth to the balanced dish.

LATITUDE Bistro's version of char kway teow comes with Chinese sausages, eggs, surf clams, silver sprouts, chye sim, prawns, silver fish, fermented radish, yellow noodles and rice noodles.

FUN FACT

The dish started as a humble meal of rice noodles fried with lard and dark soy sauce. During the Japanese occupation (1942–1945), tapioca was widely used in cooking due to its low cost and tapioca noodles were introduced into the dish. In the '50s and '60s, duck eggs were commonly used instead of chicken eggs.



Tian Tian Chicken Rice

Hainanese chicken rice is one of Singapore's most famous signatures. The version that we enjoy is adapted from a traditional recipe introduced by immigrants from Hainan province in Southern China. The dish that's eaten in Hainan is called Wenchang chicken—which is famous because of its yellow fatty skin and flavourful meat. There, this fine quality local chicken is boiled, seasoned, and served with a mixture of ginger, garlic and salt, along with steamed rice.

Everyone has their favourite chicken rice stall in Singapore. But one of the most famous spots for Hainanese chicken rice is Tian Tian at Maxwell Food Centre, which attracts snaking queues every day at lunch time. Fans hanker for a plate of the succulent poached chicken and fluffy fragrant rice cooked in richly flavoured chicken stock, accompanied by homemade chilli and sweet dark soy sauce.

Tian Tian's first generation owner Foo Kui Lian opened the stall in 1986, and since then has strived to use only fresh chicken for the dish. Although she handed over the reins to her daughter Loi Mui Yin in 2009, the 73-year-old is still actively running the Maxwell outlet. Besides the original outlet at Maxwell Food Centre, they now have other outlets in Bedok and Clementi.

For an equally satisfying Hainanese chicken rice meal, head to LATITUDE Bistro for their poached chicken and rice, served with cucumber and soup of the day. 🍲

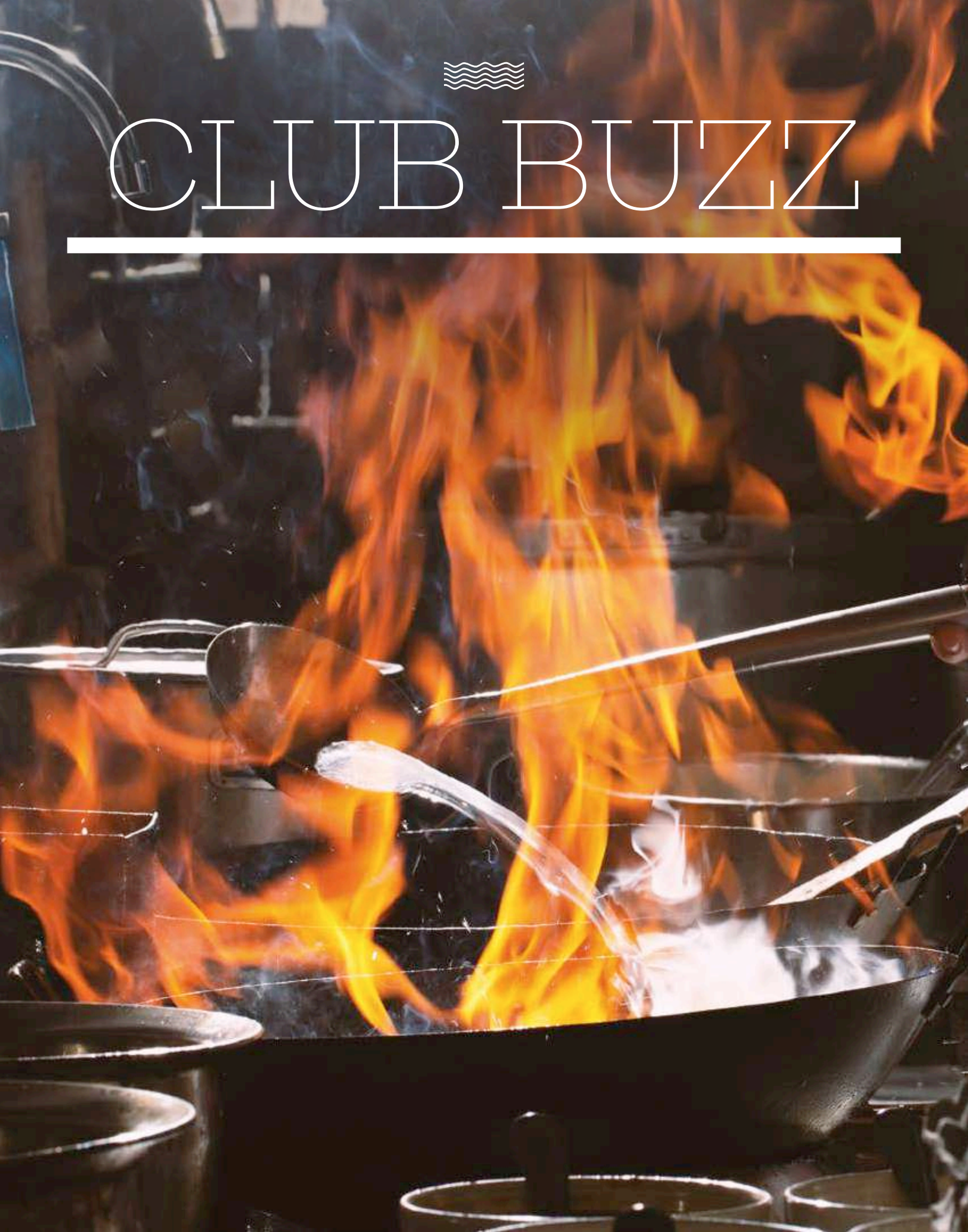


FUN FACT

Chicken rice today comes in two popular versions, the Hainanese and Cantonese—the latter is associated with the introduction of soy sauce to the dish. Regardless, chicken rice is (unofficially) the national dish of Singapore.

Organised in collaboration with Wade Pearce of SG Marine Guide, the Singapore Yachting Festival (SYF), which lit up the Club's grounds from 27 to 30 April saw a total of 9,250 visitors, more than 60 yachts and 72 participating businesses. The Opening Ceremony kicked off with welcome addresses by Wade and Chairman and CEO Arthur Tay, who touched on the yachting industry in Southeast Asia, the current trends, and their hopes that the uptick in the yachting lifestyle in Singapore will continue. Wade expressed confidence that it would rise up to become a part of the culture. The Opening Ceremony was graced by VIPs including the CEO of Sentosa Development Corporation Thein Kwee Eng; Assistant CEO of Sentosa Development Corporation Michael Ma; and General Manager of Sentosa Cove Resort Management Chew Yun Meng. The Southeast Asia Yachting Conference,

Supercars Porsche, Lamborghini and Ferrari joined the hit parade on 28, 29 and 30 April respectively.

Sea toys such as Seabob and E-foiling took the stage as well. The latter, an electric surfboard by The Kinetic Option and WaveShark, was launched at SYF. Entrepreneur Daniel He, Co-founder of The Kinetic Option shares more in his profile on page 18.

It was a true celebration of the yachting lifestyle with RHIB tours of The Southern Islands, which gave boat enthusiasts a sneak preview of the potential a full ride could offer.
